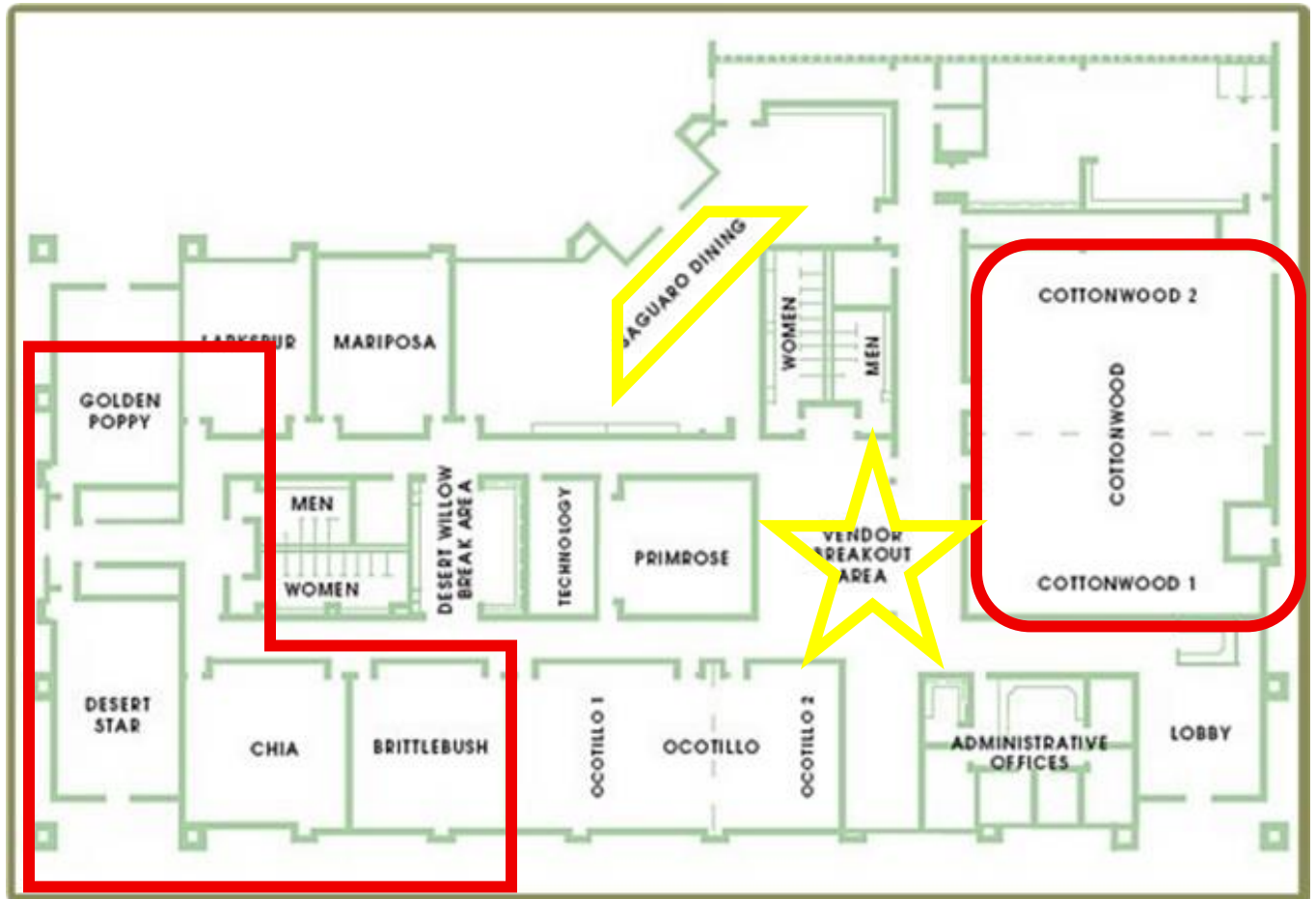

# DETAIL OF BREAKOUT SESSIONS

**9:30 - 10:30 AM**

### **Brittlebrush: Wellness Coaching for Youth: (Understanding youth brain development and its impact on workforce**

*Silvia Chavez, Yvette Medina, Adriana Molina*

This session explores how adolescent brain development—particularly the role of the frontal cortex—impacts behavior, decision-making, and emotional regulation in youth ages 13 and older. Participants will gain a foundational understanding of how brain development influences workplace readiness, including impulse control, problem-solving, and responses to stress. Using a trauma-informed lens, this session will guide case managers and youth professionals in recognizing how past experiences and environmental stressors shape behavior and engagement. Participants will learn practical strategies to support youth experiencing anxiety, depression, and work-related stress while fostering emotional regulation and confidence. The session will also highlight the importance of resilience-building, including how to support youth in navigating setbacks such as not obtaining a job, and how to reframe these experiences as opportunities for growth. Through discussion and application, participants will leave with tools to coach youth toward long-term wellness and workforce success.

### **Chia: Developing your Inner Brave**

*Doug Campbell*

Doug Campbell, Agency President, will lead a session on “Developing Your Inner Brave,” exploring how courage can be intentionally built as a skill that helps individuals navigate uncertainty, take meaningful risks, and grow as leaders. Drawing on the Bravery Workshop framework, the presentation will introduce practical concepts for recognizing fear, building momentum toward goals, and developing the confidence needed to make courageous decisions in the workplace. Doug will also share his raw, real-life leadership journey, reflecting on how these tools helped him navigate challenges and ultimately rise to executive leadership. His story will provide a relatable example of how courage and intentional growth can shape a career. At the end of the presentation, attendees will be able to scan a QR code to access additional learning tools and resources designed to help individuals and teams continue building the foundational blocks of courage and set themselves—and their workforce—up for long-term success.

Zaneta leads Lifeology as the designated lead agency for the National Safe Place program in Maricopa County, overseeing a network of more than 140 Safe Place sites that provide immediate access to help youth in crisis. Her work focuses on building strong partnerships across schools, community organizations, and workforce systems to create coordinated, youth-centered solutions. With a commitment to collaboration, sustainability, and real-world impact, Zaneta is dedicated to developing innovative approaches that align funding, services, and community resources to improve outcomes for young people.

In her role, she supports participants with felony convictions who are actively on probation, parole, or recently released from incarceration as they work to overcome barriers to employment through skills development and job readiness preparation. Marina develops and facilitates strength and mindset-based curriculum for participants both in and out of custody that focuses on enhancing their interpersonal and employability skills to support successful workforce reintegration. She also works closely with Smart Justice Career Advisors to coach and prepare participants

for employment, helping participants strengthen the confidence, mindset, and readiness needed to successfully enter the workforce.

### **APARNA GUPTA**

Aparna Gupta is one of the Managing Partners of Phoenix Computer Academy. Aparna is responsible for setting strategic direction of the company and interacting with government and federal agencies to secure grants if applicable, for students. Aparna has experience in workforce development since 2009 and is well versed with current demands of economy about industry trends and skills desired.

### **ANNA HUNTER**

Anna Hunter, Assistant Director, Division of Employment and Rehabilitation Services (DERS) Anna has been a dedicated leader within the Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES) for over 16 years. In 1998, she became the State Welfare-to-Work (WtW) Coordinator with the Georgia Department of Labor. She continued to serve various roles at the Georgia Department of Labor, eventually serving as General Counsel to the Commissioner of the Department. In 2019, she relocated to Arizona, to be closer to family, and transitioned to the Arizona Department of Economic Security, where she currently serves as a Senior Policy Manager, overseeing three teams which provide policy and support to the agency's various workforce development teams.

During her career, Nancy has been extensively involved in the development of policies for the various workforce development programs, including JTPA, WtW, and the multiple funding sources under both the Workforce Investment Act and the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, with an eye on keeping policies flexible and useful for both State and local staff. Her goal is to ensure policies are clear and unambiguous, yet flexible so that services are provided to the public in the manner as intended by the enacting legislation.
